# LOOKING TOWARDS EDINBURGH

We have two shows heading to Edinburgh this year, the Real Inspector Hound by Tom Stoppard, directed by Ed Kiely, and HERO, a musical written by current Cambridge students Ashley Riches and Ben Nicholls, and directed by Matt Eberhardt.

# The Real Inspector Hound (*C*+2):

Higgs, the premiere theatre critic, has disappeared, so Moon fills in. On stage, Inspector Hound seeks a murderous madman. But who is the body behind the chaise longue? In Tom Stoppard's theatrical whodunit, where does theatre end and reality begin?

Set in a theatre during a production of an Agatha-Christie-esque murder mystery, The Real Inspector Hound cuts between the action on stage and the reactions of two critics watching the play. Progressively the distinction between theatre and reality becomes blurred with hilarious and tragic consequences for the characters. Especially the critics.

Stoppard takes great pleasure in toying with the audience's expectations, both in the plotline of the play itself and within the wider realm of the theatre. The difficulty presented by the Real Inspector Hound, and what makes it so exciting and challenging to take to Edinburgh, lies in making the production reflect the theatrical climate of the festival. How far can criticism be objective? How dependent is theatre on a number of tired conventions? And, more philosophically, where does drama end and reality begin?

## **HERO** (*C-1*):

HERO tells the story of Telephos as he flies, falls and finds, following him around Ancient Greece, quite literally to Hell and back, as he tries to discover the meaning of being a real hero. Fast-paced and action-packed, crammed with loveable characters and memorable songs, HERO is a show which will have you laughing, crying and desperately trying not to stand up and join in! From Cambridge University, birthplace of the genius of Fry, Laurie, Cleese and Baron Cohen, comes a new musical.

HERO is an eclectic and exciting take on the conventional musical theatre love story, fully aware (musically and textually) of its place in a long line of musical theatre genres and styles, yet it is fully its own, not derivative or imitative in any way. Written by two ADC members, Ashley Riches and Ben Nicholls we are proud to be taking this piece of new writing to the Edinburgh Fringe. It's hard to know what to say about new writing before it's been tested in front of an audience, but we think the best thing so far is the reaction we've had when extracts from the score have been played to friends, family and complete randomers. The lyrics are "beautiful" and "haunting", the music "incredibly powerful".

Of course new writing is difficult to sell; we all know that. But where better to try and test a new musical than the Edinburgh Fringe, with its generously critical and open audiences? With its racy plot, huge range of songs and lovable characters HERO promises an incredible hour or two of musical theatre, and we're confident that with a good publicity and production team we can sell the show far and wide. If you're in Edinburgh this August (or in Cambridge through July) come and check us out at C-1!
